# Picture News in the Oaks

In Oaks Class, the children have been continuing to develop their understanding of both our school values and British Values, their importance and how they work to connect us as a school family and link us to the wider world. During Picture News this week, inspired by the recent school closures due to unsafe concrete, the children considered whether our school is more than just a building. The children were unanimous in their decision that Ilsham was more of a family than just a building and that it is the school's sense of belonging, values and people that make the school what it is. We furthered this discussion, through considering how the British Values of Mutal Respect and Tolerance helped to make our school the community it is. I was very impressed with the levels of thought and the articulate manner in which all of the class expressed their views.

## Bonjour from the Rowans

This week the Rowans have been learning how to introduce themselves in French. As part of the lesson the children learnt how to introduce themselves and how to say hello to each other. ## Music Development

We are continuing to develop and refine our Music offer for the children. Over the course of the week, our Music Lead, Mrs Guntrip, has spent time dropping into lessons and speaking to children. The children have been overwhelming in their enthusiasm and affirmation for their learning in Music and how the curriculum has moved forwards. Mrs Guntrip has also spent time working with the teachers as she has held an open classroom for staff to drop in and watch her teaching, as well as team teaching alongside other members of staff. We will continue to develop and push forward our curriculum to provide the best possible curriculum for the children.

## **Realising the Possible**

## Science in the Hollies

Hollies embarked on a journey to unravel the secrets of how we hear sounds and delved into the world of vibrations, one of the key elements in the science of sound.

We carried out a variety of experiments; rice jumping on a drum, elastic bands stretched to different tensions, speaking into inflated balloons and noticing the vibrations, and wine glass



rubbing, where the children filled glasses to different levels and observed the change in sound pitch. Having carried out the experiments, children began to draw connections between what they observed and the sounds they hear in their daily lives.

Our scientists are eager to explore more complex concepts, such as the anatomy of the ear, how sound travels through different materials, and the creation of their very own musical instruments.




#### Historians in Monkey Puzzles

Monkey Puzzles have been continuing, as Historians, their exploration of the Industrial Revolution. As a class, they have been considering what life was like before the Industrial Revolution and how this period of change had an impact on Britain. They have been carefully considering if all the changes (due to this period in history) were positive or if there were negative aspects which also occurred due to the progression of the industrial landscape of Britain. This learning has supported the children to think about whether all 'things' which are made possible are positive or if there can also be negative elements to progress and development.

## Scientists in the Maples


