### **Removing Barriers**

#### **Testing materials for a space tether in the Rowans**

NASA gave the Rowans a very important job this week. NASA wanted to design a space tether and entrusted us to test out different stretchy materials that are strong enough to withstand a space mission. The children discovered that a curlywurl is stretchy but not strong enough, but tights and an elastic band were very stretchy and strong. The Rowans discovered that a space tether is made of high stretch fibre such as spectra or kevlar. This is a combination of nylon spandex fibres and liquid cooling tubes.

They explored the depths of the cave and were mesmerised by the history that came along with them. To end the day, the children took part in a trail in the woodland area, where they were able to consolidate all of their learning from the day. 

### Dazzling Dancing in the Beeches

### We are Science Writers in The Hollies.

This week, Hollies have been immersing themselves in the world of microbes! We are focusing on the writing purpose 'to inform' this half term and are exploring a variety of information texts to identify how writers inform their readers in an entertaining way. We have looked at grammatical devices that writers use, such as subheadings, rhetorical questions, subordinating conjunctions, and simple sentences to create impact. We will be delving deeper into the world of microbes such as bacteria and fungi and be writing our own information text using the literary devices we have been learning how to use.



### Geography in the Oaks

This week, we started our new geography topic, which is designed to answer our enquiry question: 'How does the climate of the three Scandinavian countries impact settlement and land use?' The children enjoyed working together using atlases to answer a variety of questions about Scandinavia, find similarities and differences between its countries and then posed their own geographical questions about the area. I was impressed with the way in which the children used their geographical understanding to reason about what kind of climate the region might have.
