Stronger Together

Safeguarding Lead Forum

At Ilsham, we believe in being "Stronger Together," and we are excited to share how our commitment to this value is reflected in our ongoing efforts to enhance the safety and well-being of our students. As Designated Safeguarding Lead, Mr. Grinsill, and Deputy Safeguarding Lead, Mrs. Bennett, recently collaborated with Safeguarding leads from across our school trust to deepen our knowledge and expertise in the Prevent strategy.

Through this collaborative effort, we aim to strengthen our ability to identify and address potential risks, with a particular focus on the biggest threat to primary-aged children. In today's digital age, online safety is of paramount importance, and we are dedicated to equipping our students with the skills and knowledge they need to navigate the online world safely and mitigate the risks of online radicalisation.



Online Grooming – The act of developing a relationship with a child to enable their abuse and exploitation both online and offline.

Online platforms, such as online gaming, social media, messaging and live streaming, can be used to do this. Online Exploitation – an individual or group using online platforms to take advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, manipulate or deceive a child or young person under the age of 18 into sexual and/ or criminal activity that can occur both online and offline.

Historians in the Maples



As Historians, the Maples were exploring the reasons why the Romans wanted to invade Britain. In groups, the children worked together to pick 6 reasons they thought were the most important reasons explaining why they would want to invade. There was such rich discussion in each group and it was wonderful to walk around and hear the conversations the children were having. They were considering each reason with a lot of thought and discussing why it would/wouldn't be one of the most important reasons for invading Britain.





Citizens of the World in Monkey Puzzles

This week in Year 6, the children have been learning about the Hindu worldview. They have been considering how, for Hindus, they hold a belief in Brahman and how the qualities that Brahman possesses can be represented by a number of different murti. In addition, the children explored how the Hindu concept of God is very different to the concept held by people of an Abrahamic faith. Our Year 6's have been wonderful at expressing the importance of learning about the different worldviews that people hold in the world and how their learning will help them to hold informed, knowledgeable conversations with people who hold different beliefs to themselves in the future.


Colour Mixing in the Rowans

This week the Rowans were introduced to a local artist, Liese Webley. We discovered she is a local abstract artist, using nature as her inspiration. Before we began painting nature inspired art like Liese, we started off by learning what primary colours are. The children were then fascinated to learn when primary colours are mixed; they get secondary colours. Once the children felt confident making secondary colours on their colour wheel, they recreated one of Liese's paintings.



Painting with Primary Colours in the Beeches


This week, the Beeches began our new unit for art focusing on the fabulous artist, Eric Carle. We learnt some key facts about his life and thought about our favourite books before diving into his artwork. We discovered that his paintings are bold and colourful and almost all of them are animals! We enjoyed using the primary colours to make secondary colours and creating a bright colour wheel. Miss Rowe-Jones was super impressed when more than one child came in and saw the paint trays and instantly said 'those are primary colours!' Can't wait to see what beautiful paintings we produce this half term.





States of Matter in the Hollies

As scientists, the Hollies asked questions, and ordered and classified different matter into Venn diagrams. We discussed the properties of solids, liquids and gasses, and spoke about how something can belong to two different categories at the same time. We began to discuss processes that can change a state, for example a raw egg to a hardboiled egg – one you can pour, a property of a liquid, and the other, you can break, a property of a solid. We experimented with sand and discussed how, even though it can be poured out of a container when it is dry, it is still a solid as each individual grain keeps its own shape. We can't wait to continue our exciting journey into changing states of matter next week!



History in the Oaks

This week, Oaks continued to explore our unit question (Was the Viking invasion successful?) through a deeper review of who the Vikings were, where they came from and why they raided. The children were able to make use of primary and secondary historical sources to explore why the Vikings left Scandinavia, why they settled where they did and why they raised. It was brilliant to see the children able to challenge their previous misconceptions about the Vikings and make links to their prior learning in geography about Scandinavia.
