Stronger Together

RE Development

Led by Mrs. Guntrip, our team engaged in a Professional Development session focused on enhancing the teaching of Religious Education (RE). Sense of Belonging

Looking After the Wider Environment

As global citizens, the Rowans having been exploring how they look after the wider environment. As a class we discussed what we mean by the term 'environment' and how this means all of the things around us. The children learnt that these can be physical features as well as natural features. As a whole class we then looked at various ways in which we can make a difference to help to look after our environment. Inspired by this, the children created their own fantastic posters to show how they are going to go forward into the wider world and help to look after their environment.







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Persuading Consumers to Think and Buy More Sustainably

In English, The Hollies continue our unit on writing to persuade. This week, we began writing an advert for a product called Stroodles – a straw made from just water and flour, just like a noodle. We have researched the impact on the environment of single use plastic to help us make more convincing arguments for the use of sustainable products. The children were shocked to see the amount of plastic that gets discarded into the oceans and the impact this has on marine life and other creatures. I am looking forward to the powerful arguments the children will be posing in favour of sustainable products.

Global Citizens in the Maples

As global citizens, the Maples have been exploring the religion of Islam. This week, the children recapped the importance of the first chapter of the Qur'an before moving on to exploring Muslims place of worship, the Mosque and why prayer is so important to Muslims. We explored the main prayer positions and learnt how Muslims pray at the same times each day. The children were mesmerised by the intricate details within a Mosque and were asking some very well thought out questions to extend their knowledge. The Maples ended their lesson by identifying and labelling the key features of a Mosque, which they absolutely loved.

Together, our school council have started to assess our school's sustainability practices. Through a comprehensive school audit, the Council aims to identify areas where we can make positive changes to reduce our environmental impact. The early findings from this audit will be integrated into our collaborative efforts with Turning Heads on the upcoming garden regeneration project. They considered both the importance of the pulse and tempo and how, for the lyrics, they would need to carefully consider different rhythmic patterns to suit the pulse.
